COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is an advanced class in product design, software development, project management, and working together as a cross-functional team.

Students will work together in small teams to create a mobile application for iOS or Android devices, and then publish it in the Apple App Store or Google Play Store. Teams will consist of computer science majors and journalism students.

No knowledge of mobile application development is necessary for the class.

In addition to learning about software development, emphasis will be placed on coming up with ideas for applications, doing user research, prototyping those applications, and creating a design.

To help publicize their projects, each team will also create videos to be used as advertisements for the app.

Students will also write a tutorial about a technology topic as part of the class.

OBJECTIVES

Students who complete all of the work for this course will be familiar with how to create mobile applications. They will also understand how user research informs application design.

They will also have created and shipped their own product, working together as a cross-functional team.

In addition to product design and development, individual students will write a technology tutorial that they could potentially publish on the web.

STRUCTURE

The first phase of the class is team creation, idea formation, and building foundation skills.

The second phase of the class is mobile application design, user research, and iteration, along with specific tutorials for the skills students need to build their applications.

The subsequent phases of the class are to develop and build the application iteratively.

At the end of the class, each team will have submitted their application to the respective App Store, and there will be a final presentation to a panel of judges from industry and from the University.

ASSESSMENTS AND GRADING

Assignments will be due at 11:59pm on the date for each assignment. Each assignment will have a grading rubric that explains how the project will be evaluated, found in Canvas.

Many assignments are team assignments, however some assignments are individual assignments.

There are no quizzes or tests in this class, as well as no final exam.

40% - Individual Effort

You will turn in diary-style updates on your own effort in helping your team achieve its goals. Your instructor will grade you based on the effort you put into these diary posts and on your effort in the class during that period (as observed by the instructor and as outlined by you). You will also review the work of your teammates. This is to help the instructor gauge the work of all the teammates.

30% - Product Development Process (Team)

As part of this grade, your team will also be required to turn in an initial elevator pitch for app ideas, a more detailed pitch for the app your team chooses to work on, sprint plans, end-of-sprint documentation/presentations and a final presentation. You'll also do QA assignments, a design assignment and more. Part of this grade will be whether your team submits your app to be published by April 9.

15% - Technical Tutorial Assignment (Individual)

You will select a technical subject related to something with your app development project, and then write a tutorial that another student in your major could follow. Part of this grade is the writing, and part of the grade will be based on reviewing another student's tutorial. The writing assignment is due on February 12, and the review is due on February 26.

10% - Videos (Team)

Throughout the course of the semester, you are required to create two videos. The videos should be related to your process and product and will be used during your final presentation. You will be graded on the content, quality and creativity of these videos. The first video is due on March 5, and the second video is due on April 16.

5% - Blogging (Team)

Your team is expected to post on medium.com, your own website or another publishing platform at least 5 times during the semester about your progress. If you hit all the requirements listed on the blog post assignments, this is a completion grade. This responsibility should be split among team members.

ASSIGNMENT POLICY

Each of the assignments will be due at 11:59pm Central (Austin Time).

Late work

All assignments turned in after deadline will be marked down 10 percentage points for the first 24 hours after the due time and then 10 percentage points for every 24 hours after that.
